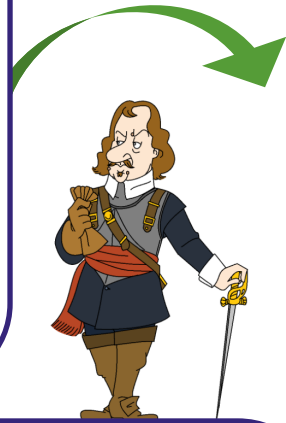
British Empire - The Civil War

- The Romans invaded other countries too and the empire covered much of Europe, North Africa and the Middle East

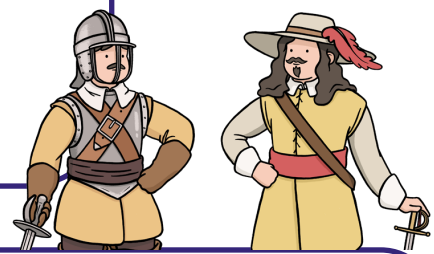

New Knowledge:

- Some evidence/sources of information are more reliable than others.
- When we write history, we need to create interpretations of the past, based on evidence.
- Inferences are drawn from a variety of primary sources to create interpretations of the past.
- A civil war is conflict between people in the same country.
- In 1629, King Charles I dismissed parliament and resolved to rule alone.
- Parliament was similar to democracy in the Ancient Greek times as it also made decision by majority votes.
- King Charles attempted to stop democracy in Britain leading to the English Civil War, which started in 1642.
- He ignored parliament, collected taxes that people felt were unreasonable and arrested MP's.
- The parliamentarians were known as Roundheads and the Royalists were known as the Cavaliers
- The execution of King Charles I took place in 1649. His son, Charles II escaped to France and Oliver Cromwell was made Lord Protector. There were a series of conflicts, including the battle of Nantwich— which took place in 1644.
