

New Knowledge:

- People can learn from parables, because stories are easy to remember, and they remind us of things we do in our own lives. Jesus told many parables as a way of teaching people important things about God and how we should live.
- The Parable of the Tax Collector and the Pharisee teaches people to pray with the right attitude. The tax collector had pleased God, as he had been humble and asked for forgiveness, whereas the Phraisee only prayed about what a good person he was.
- The Parable of the Friend at Midnight teaches Christians that they need to be persistent with their prayers – pray without giving up. If you pray consistently, then your prayers are more likely to be answered.
- The Parable of the Judge and the Widow explores the relationship between a Christian and God.
- The Parable of the Mustard Seed teaches Christians that great things can grow from small beginnings. Jesus used this parable to teach that although the Kingdom of God started small, with Jesus and the disciples, it would grow and spread across the world to unlimited numbers of followers.
